Citizen-Science

September has been full of many exciting learning opportunities here at school. Our fifth through twelfth grade students participated in some citizen science by tagging butterflies and collecting samples to aid scientists in researching Ophryocystis Elektroscirrha (OE), a debilitating protozoan parasite that infects monarchs. Those students ended the day on a Zoom call with Monarch scientists researching migration and the Monarch parasites.

Community Partnership

On September 18th, our students also joined our island community members and senior citizens with a Packers themed lunch in the community gym. We look forward to another similar opportunity to partner with WICHP with them by serving a holiday-themed breakfast at school just

before Christmas.

We're also continuing to look for ways to open the school to our community. This month we've added the Fab-Lab adult class that began September 20th. Community members in these opportunities will have the opportunity to explore the digital fabrication laboratory and learn about the various machines and the design softwares, and will have the option to focus on projects in the Fab Lab 0r Woods Shop.




Bay Beach Blast A Summer Narrative

The morning was foggy, but the Island Adventure Voyageur canoe, filled with high school students and a fearless leader in a red French Voyageur hat made by Mary Grzelak, found its way to Rock Island on Friday morning, September 29th. The canoe is similar to the ones the French fur traders used passing by Rock Island in the 1700s. The Karfi carried the rest of the Washington Island students for their biennial Rock Island trip. For many years. Mrs. Nehlsen took the juniors and seniors to Rock Island after studying the life of Chester Thordarson and using the perfect backdrop of the Viking Hall in the boathouse to perform the poem of Beowulf to the juniors and senior students of Sevastopol. The all-school Washington Island School trip to Rock Island was started years after with the thought that all the students at Washington Island School should know the history of the home they came from. The Town of Washington actually began on Rock Island in 1850.

This year the students were split up into groups of six or seven from different grade levels, and half of the groups headed to the Pottawatomie Lighthouse for a tour in the morning, while the other half toured the boathouse and hiked on the south side finding fossils, plants, and other natural features that were on a Scavenger Hunt list created by Steve Waldron. Other teachers put together a Scavenger hunt list for students to learn the lay of the land and the history of Rock Island, including the lighthouse, the Native Americans and the fishermen and their families that once lived there, the French ships that passed by trading furs, fish, and other goods, as well as the life of Chester Thordarson, which students could read about in the boathouse. By 11:30 A.M. all the groups met near the boathouse for a picnic lunch and then switched activities for the afternoon.

By the end of the day, the fog had long cleared out, and the high school students had the opportunity to row in the Voyageur canoe back to Washington Island. The rest of the students rode the Karfi, some for the first time in their lives. It was a great experience for all!
